I am sure that you will agree with me the first couple of weeks have been very settled. Our staff had carefully planned how they were going to teach our students the school's expectations as well as establishing high quality routines and transitions. Establishing these processes now will ensure that teachers can get on with the important work of teaching and our students can concentrate and focus on their learning.

Please help your child to meet our expectations and to demonstrate pride in themselves and our school by:

- Wearing the correct school uniform every day
- Wearing their hair tied back
- Adhering to our jewellery expectations; allowable items include medical alert jewellery, a signet ring, one pair of stud or sleeper earrings, and a watch
- Ensuring that no make-up including nail polish is worn
- Arriving to school on time and organised with their lunch and fruit break
- Getting plenty of sleep as this helps to move learning from the short term memory to the long term memory
- Participating daily in our school's Turtle Reading program.

Aunty Paula is our school's Student and Family Support Officer. This is a huge job where she works for and with all families.



Aunty Paula's role at our school is way more than it used to be! She is one busy person. She still runs the extraordinarily successful Little Brother's, Little Sista's program, as well as being a general teacher aide. She is also our school's Student and Family Support Officer which is a position we created in 2016 recognising the need to have a whole school approach to assisting our families. She works with all families and not as some people think only our Indigenous families. Her role acknowledges the significant amount of time it takes to be able to co-ordinate services and support for our families and students.

Please use our School Crossings

Our crossing supervisors do a great job every day, come rain, hail or shine. The crossings have been located according the safest areas to stop traffic and to assist community to cross our busy roads. Please, please please use the crossings, even if it means walking an extra hundred metres or so. When our students see parents not using the crossings, they begin to think they can do the same, which could result in tragic outcomes. Thanks for modelling safe behaviours and actions for all.

As always you will see and hear that both Mr Theofanes and I will be in classrooms on a regular basis as we take great interest in what and how our students are learning. The students are quite used to us slipping in and joining them and there are times when some students and teachers haven't even realised that we've been there as they have been so engrossed in their own work – this is exactly as it should be.

LEMphonics News

Why is daughter spelt the same as laughter???
Why does the letter 'a' say 'ay' in baby but says 'or' in talk???

Torquay State School uses a phonics program called LEMphonics. This is a multisensory program that aims to bring listening, speaking, reading and writing all together. In this program, we talk about what sound a letter makes rather than the name of the letter. We call the letters, Phonograms. Phonograms can be made up of 1 or more letters. e.g. er, ou, ough, ng. There are 75 phonograms which make a total of 42 sounds. These phonograms and their sounds make the foundation of our program. These are then built upon to form words for spelling and reading.

Words are made up of different sounds. Some of these sounds contain one, two, three or more letters (phonograms). The sound 'ay' can be represented seven different ways.

a – baby , ay – stay, ai – paint, eigh – eight, ei – vein, ey – grey, ea – steak

The single letters are called single phonograms, e.g. a, c, d, f, x, y, z etc. The phonograms with 2 or more letters are called multiple phonograms, e.g. ay, ai, oy, oi, eigh, augh, er, tch, dge.

Some of these phonograms have rules to say when, where and why they are used. I will introduce these at a later date. Here are the single phonograms which make more than one sound.

a - (5 sounds) Dad chased the fast small wasp.
e - (2 sounds) I met Pete.
i - (2 sounds) Fish swim in line.
o - (4 sounds) The doctor is going to fix my brother's leg.
u - (3 sounds) The bus playing Ruby's music is full.
y - (3 sounds) The gymnast looks funny in my yellow hat.
c - (2 sounds) The cat in the city.
s - (2 sounds) A mouse eating chese.
g - (2 sounds) Goats eat vegetables.
x - (2 sounds) The fox plays the xylophone.
qu - (2 sounds) Two quick mosquitoes.

2017 Student Resource Scheme

If you are suffering genuine financial hardship please contact the office to discuss this further.

Medication and Medical Conditions

All families who have students taking regular daily medications should have received our authority form for this year which we require completed and returned to the office as soon as possible. If during the course of the year your child requires occasional medications ie anti-bitotics please obtain an authority form from the office and ensure that the medication has a pharmacy label on noting your child's name and dosage.

Serious Allergies

Does your child have a serious allergy? Maybe nuts? Please give the office a call to discuss the process for a medical plan.

Personal Records Update

Please contact the office should you have any change of details ie. Address, phone numbers, emergency contact details. Please consider the Emergency Contact people you have listed. In the event of your child being sick and require collecting by another person, for the safety of the child, the school is unable to release a child unless the person collecting is on the Emergency list.

Library Bags

Just a reminder that all Library Bags from last year should be returned for children to borrow books this year.

A Road Safety message from your Wide Bay Burnett District police

As it is the start of a new school year we would like to remind you about road safety around schools and ask you to revisit this with your children again. Adopt a Cops visit schools at various times and encourage everyone to use the safe environments provided to help keep the flow of traffic moving.



The children pictured here can teach everyone some safety tips: □ Designate the rear door closest to the kerb to be a safety door for children to enter or exit □ Use the drop-off and pick-up zones like a quick moving taxi rank □ Learn to recognise your vehicle and to get in and out quickly and safely when the vehicle has pulled into the signed area. Parking safely around schools is what the majority of parents and carers do, although if you're rushed and not focused, you may find you have parked contrary to road markings or signage. This behaviour may result in a traffic crash, reduced visibility for other road users and cause traffic congestion. We also need to remember that children are unpredictable and may not understand the dangers associated with roads and vehicles.

The yellow line pictured here is an area NOT to park or stop. Failing to obey this can result in a \$48 Traffic Infringement Notice for Stop contrary to continuous yellow edge line.



The sign says it all – NO stopping. Failure to obey this can result in a \$48 Traffic Infringement Notice for Stop contrary to 'NO STOPPING' sign. Some additional tips from our colleagues at Transport and Main Roads are: □ Remember to say goodbye to your children on the school side of the road – never get them to cross the road alone to their school entrance □ Walk across the road and meet your children after school – never call out to them from the other side □ Always single park. Be observant of school zone speeds and times when travelling as a parent, carer or general motorist. Why not see if there's a difference between this sign and the one at your school. Police officers will be highly visible in and around school zones, especially at the commencement of the school year, and ask community members to be on their best driving behaviour to ensure all students and teachers get to their playgrounds and classrooms safely. Remember to say "Hi" to your school crossing supervisor when they are there to assist you cross the road safely to and from school. Policelink



Many families are now using mobile electronic devices and we know technology is continuously improving. As a result you can now contact police via Policelink on 131 444. Policelink is the easy and convenient option for community members to take an active role in improving frontline policing response times and enhanced client service by using the Policelink service or reporting matters online. For example, if a community member chooses to report their stolen power tools from the back of their ute via Policelink, online or via the Policelink App instead of an officer attending the scene, this will directly enhance community safety through time being reinvested into other operational priorities. Fill in the form and hit submit. It's that easy! □ Online reporting can also be accessed via the Queensland Police Website at www.police.qld.gov.au Photos and videos can also be uploaded to include in reports, as well as a number of reporting options including: □ noisy party reporting □ 'track-my-crime' □ stolen property updates □ hooning □ wilful damage □ taxi fare evasion □ graffiti and □ withdrawal of complaint forms. Reading face book post week 1:

I am so excited to see the elation on our Prep student's faces after visiting the library this week to receive a school library bag, meet our lovely library staff Mrs Core and Mrs Maskey and to borrow a book to take home. WOW!

I would like to provide parents of our **early years students** with some tips when taking home a book to view with their family.

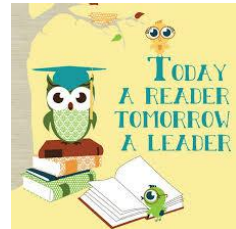
Role Play Reading:

Our Prep students show an interest in books and print they see around them. They imitate the things they see adult readers doing such as holding the book carefully, turning the pages and talking out aloud as they do so. They often retell stories they have heard as they pretend to read.

How you can help at home:

- Find a comfortable place to sit and read together
- Read to your child as often as you can (you can borrow from the library daily, you don't have to wait until your child's next library day)
- Model how to hold the book then let the child hold the book and turn the pages
- Discuss the front cover (eagle eye – look at the pictures, predict - what do you think this book might be about?)
- Discuss the back cover
- Locate the "spine" and discuss how we need to look after the books spine. Make a connection to your spine on your body and how we have to look after it
- Title (where on the book, the book is called.....)
- Author (where on the book, the author writes the words in our story)
- Illustrator (where on the book, the illustrator draws the pictures in our story)

When reading to your child, read with PASSION and FIREWORKS! If your child see's your enthusiasm for reading, they too will have the love of books and love to read.

What's On



FIND A FROG IN FEBRUARY



Community assistance is needed to find out where our frogs are living from **Burrum** Heads south to **Perignan** and west to Conondale Range, Killkivan and Mt Walsh. Frogs are a vital component of ecosystems and can be good indicators of environmental health. But they are in trouble world-wide due to habitat loss, pollution and disease and we need to know more about where they are.



Can you help? We want to improve our knowledge in the Mary, Noosa, **Burrum** River catchments and coastal region in between.

Information gathered will help to improve the plight of frogs through awareness and thoughtful management.

All records will be stored in the WildNet database (Queensland Government) where it can be accessed by researchers, planners and anyone who is interested.



Jump into being a frog searcher this February. You don't need to be able to identify frogs, just record your **observations**, take photos and/or record their calls. We will do the identification.

A copy of the Queensland Museum pocket guide; 'Frogs of South East Queensland' is available to the first 200 frog finders.
